Admissions and progression

When enrolling in an English course at UTS College, you'll need to provide an original copy of an IELTS, TOEFL or PTE (Academic) test result that's less than 12 months old. Otherwise, you can complete an entry test such as VEPT (this test is available through UTS College representative offices). This will determine the appropriate level to begin your English language studies before you start your chosen UTS College academic course or UTS undergraduate/postgraduate degree.

Period of validity of results for entry to UTS College

The guidelines on the following pages are minimum requirements based on IELTS, TOEFL (iBT) or PTE (Academic) scores less than 12 months old at the time of commencing your English course at UTS College. To qualify to enter a particular level, you'll need to provide an original IELTS, TOEFL (iBT) or PTE (Academic) test result.

UTS College placement test

If you don't have a current IELTS, TOEFL (iBT), PTE or approved equivalent result, you'll need to sit the UTS College placement test (known as a VEPT or Versant English Placement Test). If you're already in Sydney, ask your agent to arrange a placement test at UTS College.

Exit testing

You'll take tests at the end of each level of study. Your overall results, including these test results, will be used to determine your progress. To progress to the next level, you must achieve a pass in the final examinations in all skills (Listening, Speaking, Reading, and Writing). This is to demonstrate that you've achieved the learning outcomes as well as an overall pass. You'll receive feedback and support on your other assessments throughout the course.

Entry to UTS

When you successfully complete Academic English Level 5 (AEL5) with a pass grade, you satisfy the English entry requirement for most UTS undergraduate and postgraduate courses. For details on specific courses with higher English entry requirements, please see the UTS international prospectus.

Student visas

The above guidelines are based on UTS College academic advice. In certain countries, Australian immigration guidelines may determine the length of English study possible. Please check first with your local Australian immigration office for your country's guidelines.

Language course levels

UTS College offers Academic English courses which meet a broad range of language needs. These courses lead to:

English pathways

Academic English (AE)

There are five levels in the UTS College Academic English (AE) course. In AE levels 1 to 5 there are ten weeks of intensive English learning. Each level consists of 200 hours of direct instruction. That's a total of 1000 hours for students completing the full program. Most students tend to complete 10–20 weeks of study. Your study plan will depend on your high-stakes test result or a VEPT result.

Modes of Study

The Academic English courses are delivered in a full time and face-to-face mode in timetabled classes on campus.

Academic English for Foundation

Successful completion of Academic English for Foundation (AEL3) allows you direct entry* into UTS Foundation Studies and the UTS College extended diploma program (with entry requirements of IELTS 5.5 overall with minimum 5.0 in all bands). Completing our English AEL3 course means you don't need an IELTS test when you complete your course.

Academic English for Diploma

Successful completion of Academic English for Diploma (AEL4) allows you direct entry* into UTS College standard or accelerated diploma courses and UTS College graduate certificate courses (courses with entry requirement of IELTS 6.0 overall with 6.0 in writing). Completing our English AEL4 course means you don't need an IELTS test when you complete your course.

Academic English for Bachelor/Masters

Successful completion of Academic English for Bachelor/Master (AEL5) allows you entry to UTS College Accelerated Graduate Certificate courses and direct entry* into most UTS undergraduate and postgraduate degrees (with entry requirements of IELTS 6.5). Completing our English AEL5 course means you don't need an IELTS test when you complete your course.

Pathways

Teacher-guided computer lessons using CALL (Computer Assisted Language Learning) activities – and materials relevant to class lessons – support each level of English. The table on page 5 explains the pathway through the different AE levels.

After successfully completing AEL3, you're ready to move onto AEL4. You may also commence the UTS Foundation Studies program, or extended diploma courses at UTS College.

After successfully completing AEL4, you have achieved the level of language proficiency required for entry into:

- UTS College diploma programs (standard and accelerated)
- UTS College standard graduate certificates

After successfully completing AEL5, you have achieved the level of language proficiency required for entry into:

- UTS College accelerated graduate certificate courses
- most undergraduate and postgraduate courses at UTS and selected other universities.

You will also need to meet the university's academic requirements in their subject area.

Assessment methods

You'll find information about specific assessment tasks in the assessment briefs given to you in the first week of class. You're assessed on learning outcomes for each of the following skills: writing, reading, speaking, and listening. Assessment includes most or all the following elements: extended written assignments, group oral presentations, group discussions, reading and note-taking tasks, listening and note-taking tasks, and final examinations. The process for marking and grading assessments is standardised to make sure grading is consistent and fair.

Please note, you need to demonstrate that you've passed the learning outcomes for all four macro skills (writing, reading, speaking, and listening), to pass the course.

*English and academic entry requirements apply. Please refer to the courses page of our website for course information, entry requirements and articulation details. Successful completion of AEL5 satisfies the English Language Admission requirements for most UTS Undergraduate and Post Graduate degrees. For specific details of UTS English entry requirements please refer to the individual faculty pages on the UTS website.

Learning Outcomes

Special features

At all levels, there are opportunities to practise academic skills, such as research, critical thinking, reflection, time management, and collaboration, while using technology in your learning. Courses are designed to help you become an independent language learner.

Our English programs include these special features:

You can improve your English language and practise academic skills using modern technology and the world's leading web-based learning management system, CANVAS, at all five levels of Academic English (AE1-AE5).

We've designed UTS College's Academic English courses to help you become an independent language learner. You'll have opportunities to learn and develop academic skills such as research, critical thinking, reflection, time management, collaboration, and academic integrity.

Your Academic English course will also include lessons and activities focused on improving listening, speaking, reading, writing, note-taking, and grammar. Each level has additional targeted support – provided by the UTS College HELPS Centre resources in CANVAS – where you can study independently and find practice materials to help you improve all the skills you need to succeed.

HELPS Centre

You also have free access to **Studiosity**, our online 24-hour, seven day a week academic and study skills feedback service. It offers live chat with subject specialists anytime, anywhere, or you can submit your writing for timely feedback. You can access **Studiosity** on Canvas.

On-campus physical resources

Visit the HELPS Centre for a wide range of English language resources such as grammar books, dictionaries, listening materials and IELTS practice books. There are also graded readers (fiction books that have been adjusted for different English levels). Also, you'll find industry magazines in Business, Science, Information Technology, and Design & Architecture. The HELPS Centre team is happy to help with academic skills and study-related questions.

Borrowing resources

You may borrow up to five books at a time from the HELPS Centre. It's important to return all your borrowed materials by the due date. Please remember that you can only receive your certificate at the end of your English studies when all your borrowed items have been returned.

Computers

The HELPS Centre has computers with internet access for research, emailing, and word processing. UTS College has fast, campus-wide Wi-Fi. - Writing feedback - you can submit a piece of writing and receive comprehensive writing feedback within 24 hours in the areas of grammar, referencing, cohesion and formatting.

Accommodation

Under 18 years of age

International students under 18 must use accommodation approved by the Department of Home Affairs, or UTS College approved accommodation and welfare arrangements.

If an international student's parent, legal custodian, or eligible relative wishes to care for them in Australia, they must apply to be their nominated guardian through the [Department of Home Affairs](#).

Homestay

Living with a local family is a great way to experience life in Australia and practise your spoken English. All our homestays have been specially chosen to provide a safe and supportive home environment. Each home is within 45-60 minutes travelling time from the campus, in a variety of locations around Sydney. This is a fantastic opportunity to live like a local and have an authentic Australian lifestyle experience.

Student residential accommodation

Each student residential building is purpose-built with ultra-modern facilities including study areas, collaboration zones and social spaces to connect with friends. Providing all the comforts of home in a safe, community-style setting, a student residential building has everything you need at your fingertips. It's a great option to enjoy a student lifestyle during your first time living away from home.

Special host

If an international student aged under 18 wants to live with a close family friend or a family member that doesn't meet Department of Home Affairs' definition of an eligible relative, the family friend or family member will need to apply to be a Special Host under UTS College Homestay arrangements.

Over 18 years of age

If you're over 18 years of age, you can choose from a range of accommodation options. These include homestay, student residential building, or other housing options in the private rental market. Travel concessions

Domestic students

(Australian and New Zealand Citizens and Australian PR visa holders)

For transport concessions, log into estudent.utscollege.edu.au and select the OPAL consent form to allow UTS College to give your details to Transport NSW. Once UTS College has your consent, we'll email to confirm your eligibility.

When you have our email, you can apply for a concession OPAL card at opal.com.au/ordercard or by calling 13 67 25 (13 OPAL) 24 hours, 7 days a week. Your Concession OPAL card will be mailed to you within 5-7 working days. Follow the enclosed instructions to activate your card.

International students

International students are not eligible for concession OPAL cards. To travel on public transport, international students need to purchase an Adult OPAL card. How to communicate with UTS College

Check your UTS email account

UTS College uses your UTS email account to communicate with students. That's why it's important to activate your UTS email account as soon as you enrol. Once your account is activated, you can forward any email sent to your UTS email account to your personal email account.

Check all digital signs

There are electronic notice boards throughout the buildings on campus. Please make sure you check these regularly for information about forthcoming student activities and important notices.

Contact details

It's important to keep UTS College informed of your current contact details. You can either update your contact details on eStudent, or using a Change of Contact Details form available at the UTS Student Centre.

The Department of Home Affairs requires international students to advise UTS College of any changes to their contact details within seven (7) days.

International students under the age of 18 must live in Department of Home Affairs or UTS College approved accommodation. UTS College is responsible for confirming that your accommodation and welfare arrangements are appropriate, so you'll need to contact UTS College Student Centre staff to update your contact details.

Your student ID card

On enrolment, you'll need to submit a photo for your UTS College Student Card. You can submit this through the [CaptureME portal](#). Use your computer, tablet, or smart phone to [upload your photo](#).

After submitting your photo, check your student email account for an approval or rejection email.

- If you receive a rejection email, please submit a new photo that addresses the reason for rejection given in the email. Please don't resubmit the same photo.
- If your photo is approved, then UniCard (the Student Card provider) will notify you when your ID card is ready to collect from the Student Centre (Building 5, Block C, Level 1).

When you receive your card, please make sure to sign the grey strip on the back.

Please always carry this card with you when attending UTS College. You may be asked to produce this card:

- By your teachers
- By security or administration staff
- When borrowing from the UTS Library or accessing other UTS services or facilities
- When sitting exams
- When accessing the UTS Counselling Services and UTS Health Services.

Please remember to sign your student card. If you lose it, you can arrange a replacement card (at a cost of AU\$30) at the UTS College Student Centre. It's important not to let others borrow your student card.

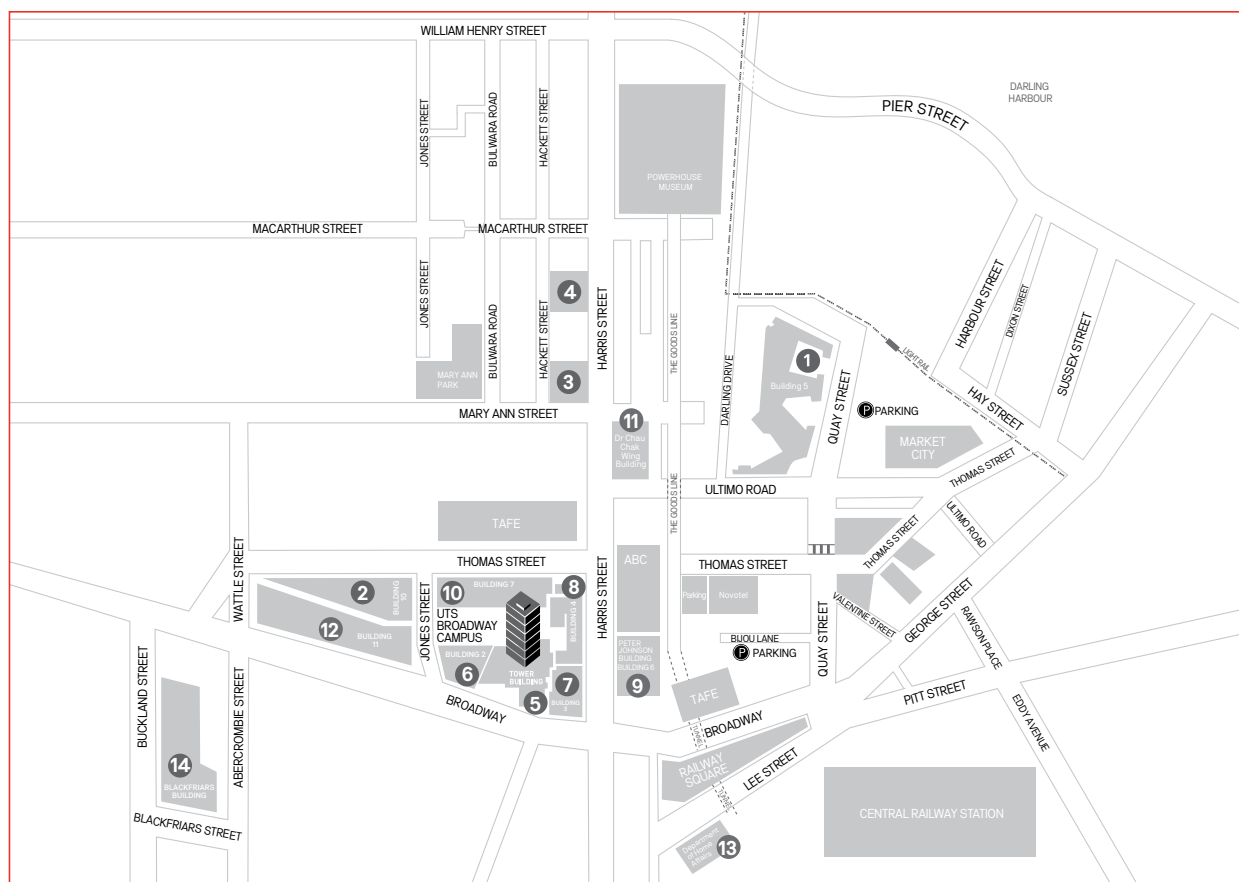

Regulations

Regulations from the Department of Home Affairs, Department of Education, and Australia Education International (AEI) apply to international students.

English language intensive courses for overseas students (ELICOS) are delivered according to Australian Government laws, national codes, and regulations. If you are an international student studying a full-time English language course in Australia, these laws, codes, and regulations apply to you.

Courses of study

Full-time English courses undertaken by overseas students in Australian education institutions must be registered nationally on the Commonwealth Register of Institutions and Courses for Overseas Students (CRICOS). A course will not be registered on CRICOS unless it meets the relevant Australian Qualifications Framework requirements.

Course Duration for full-time English (CRICOS) courses

Following your application for a full-time English course, you will receive a letter with an offer of several weeks' English language provision, and a Confirmation of Enrolment (CoE) once you have paid. Your study duration will vary according to your learning goals and will be reflected in the expected duration of study specified on your CoE. UTS College uses IELTS, TOEFL, VEPT or PTE (Academic) results to estimate your course duration and for your placement in English language courses.

If you don't have IELTS, TOEFL, VEPT or PTE (Academic) results, you'll complete a placement test when you arrive in Australia and be placed in an appropriate level. Your placement test will give an accurate estimate of your course duration.

Academic integrity

As a student at UTS College, you're expected to maintain high standards of academic honesty and integrity. Academic misconduct is defined as 'attempts by students to cheat, plagiarise or otherwise act dishonestly in undertaking an assessment task, or assisting other students to do so'. This means you're considered guilty of cheating if you seek to gain advantage by unfair means such as copying another student's work, or in any way misleading a lecturer or tutor about your knowledge, ability, or the amount of original work you have done.

Your responsibilities as a student

Examinations:

- You must not help or receive assistance from other students
- You must not request to borrow or lend materials or devices to other students
- You must not bring any materials into the examination room other than those specified for that examination
- You must not use computer software or other devices during an examination other than those specified.

Other assessment tasks:

- You must not copy or paraphrase any document, audiovisual material, computer-based material, or artistic piece from another source except in accordance with the conventions of the field of study
- You must not use another person's concepts, results or conclusions and pass them off as your own
- In cases where the assessment task is intended to be individual work, and not group work, you must not prepare an assignment collaboratively and then submit work that is substantially the same as another student's assessment
- You must not ask another person to produce an assessable item for you.

Procedures and penalties

UTS College has a range of policies and procedures available to help you understand what is required during your studies, your responsibilities, and our obligations to you.

Non-academic misconduct

As a UTS College student, you're expected to respect other students, staff, and property so that learning and teaching at UTS College can take place freely, safely and without impediment due to the misconduct of others. You're also expected to respect members of the wider community outside UTS College.

Non-academic misconduct includes contraventions of UTS College's rules, policies, and procedures. It includes, but is not limited to, breaches of confidentiality or privacy, discrimination, intimidation or assault on another student or staff member of UTS.

UTS College will report all criminal acts committed by its students to the relevant authorities.

Notification and appeal

You must be notified in writing of penalties of misconduct.

The grounds for appeal are:

- procedural irregularities, and/or
- factual errors on which the decision was based, and which were of such magnitude as to invalidate the decision.

Assessment policy

Assessments measure whether you've achieved your subjects' intended learning outcomes. The primary goals of assessments are to encourage learning and to indicate your level of progress or achievement. Assessment rules are designed to ensure that your assessment is reliable and valid. Where there is a subjective element in the grading of students' work, we conduct assessment moderation to ensure multiple assessor reliability.

Assessment is a key part of learning and teaching. UTS College promotes ethical practice and treats academic dishonesty seriously.

If you suffer from illness, misadventure or a disability that affects your ability to perform in assessments, you may be eligible to request special consideration or special needs.

**The above fees are based on no AE Level failures. Any level that needs to be undertaken a second time will require payment of the relevant level fee. Students will pay the fee that is current for the calendar year of study.*

UTS College reserves the right to vary fees and/or course dates at any time. You should factor in the likelihood of an annual UTS College fee increase into your budget, which in recent years has averaged less than four per cent.

Packages

A UTS College academic package is comprised of either:

- UTS Foundation Studies with a UTS College diploma, or
- Academic English with any other academic program, including: UTS Foundation Studies, UTS College diploma, UTS College graduate certificate, a UTS undergraduate degree or a UTS postgraduate degree.

The advantage of a packaged program is that only one visa is required for the entire study period at UTS College and UTS and you will only need to pay one international student processing fee. Where a package includes English, no further external English test will be necessary before beginning your next course at UTS College or UTS.

Non-tuition fees

The international student processing fee - A\$250 is payable once an international student accepts their UTS College offer and is non-refundable.

- Replacement English Certificate and transcript fee - A\$20
- Student card replacement fee - A\$30*
